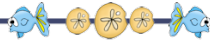

"May is Rhododendron Month" which proved once again to be a resounding success, due in large part to our many dedicated members.

At our annual Sale and Show on Sunday, May 3rd, many hands certainly made light work of the busy day. I would like to say a BIG thank you to all members who helped make this important fund raising event a success once again. Of the \$1628 net profit, over 58% (\$951) came from our own NIRS companion plant table. Again, this deserves a big thank you to all those members who donated the large assortment of plants and garden related items.

For those interested, there were 117 tickets entered in the draw for R. 'Golden Genie'. President Diana drew the winner, *Bob David of Courtenay*. There were only 27 ballots cast in the 'People's Choice' award for the truss show this year. The rhodo "Jeda" was the clear winner with 6 votes, followed by "Conroy", "Dixie Lee Ray", and "Taurus" each with 2 votes. Thanks again to all those who brought in trusses, even at the last minute, and special thanks to Bernie Guyader for providing the new name plates for the trusses. The following weekend, the weather cooperated for our annual Mother's Day Garden Tour, on Sunday May 10th, for which we sold 130 tickets. Although this number is nearly half what was sold last year, we still cleared over \$1200 net profit. Again, a big thank you to our members who sat at the gates, and to the hosts of our gardens. A special thank you to Diana Scott for arranging the gardens and organizing the volunteers, and to Don Law for posting and collecting many of the direction signs.

Forty members attended the NIRS Annual General Meeting held at the Filberg Lodge and Heritage Park in Comox on May 12th. During the meeting, President Diana read the citation on the Silver Medal award which was presented to Harry Wright at the ARS convention in Everett, Washington on May 2nd. The Silver Medal is the second highest award presented by our international organization (see details elsewhere in this newsletter.) An appropriate and well-deserved award to honour our NIRS founding member, on this our chapter's silver anniversary.

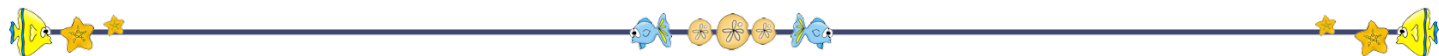
During the elections held at the AGM, Pauline Thompson was re-elected

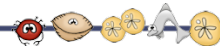
American Rhododendron Society News

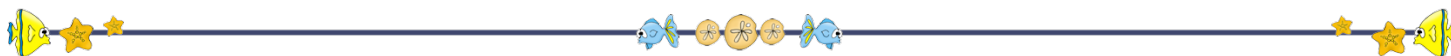
As a member of the North Island Rhododendron Society, you are part of a notable international organization called The American Rhododendron Society. The ARS is a non-profit organization whose purpose is to encourage interest in and to disseminate information about the genus Rhododendron. Members' experience ranges from novice to expert. Society activities include public education, flower shows, seed exchanges, scientific studies, and communication through publications and local and national meetings. ARS chapters are located throughout the United States and Canada and in Denmark, Holland, Scotland, Sweden and Sikkim.

NIRS is one of 9 Chapters in District 1 comprised of: Cowichan Valley, Fraser South (Langley), Fraser Valley (Maple Ridge), Mt Arrowsmith (our sister chapter in Qualicum Beach), Nanaimo, North Island, Peace Arch (South Surrey), Vancouver, and Victoria Chapters. We have a District Director, Ron Knight and an Alternate District Director, Ron McMaster, who represent our district at the regional and national levels.

As members of the ARS each of us receives a Journal 4 times a year. These magazines provide a variety of information on Rhododendrons from tips for beginners, reports on treks to rhododendron areas, articles on specific members of the genus, highlights of gardens, information on pests and diseases, society news, publications and much more. As a journal rather than a newsletter, it is also a vehicle for sharing new and scientific information. It has something for every level of rhodophile! The ARS Journal is only one of the many benefits of belonging to this respected organization.

Harry Wins The Silver!



The American Rhododendron Society awards this prestigious medal to nominees on the basis of outstanding service over a period of time to either the Society or genus Rhododendron, or both. The primary consideration shall be for regional, as opposed to national or international, contributions. The honoree must be a member of the ARS.

A petition of nomination must be directed to the Honors Committee of the ARS for the deserving applicant. The petition sets forth and documents the nominee's accomplishments and contributions. Deliberations of the committee are confidential, with final approval by a majority of the Board or its Executive Committee, whichever applies. Decisions and medal presentations are announced at Regional or National Conferences.

We share with you the text of the petition of nomination for Harry Wright

We wish to nominate Harry R. Wright for the American Rhododendron Society Silver Medal Award. Harry has been an advocate for the genus rhododendron for over 25 years and through his accomplishments and contributions to our District, is an outstanding candidate for the ARS Silver Medal.

Harry has been interested in rhododendrons since moving to the Pacific Northwest in the 1970's. As landscaper after his release from the RCAF, Harry fell in love with the genus Rhododendron. His enthusiasm for this genus resulted in the decision to buy and developed a 1.5 acre lot in Courtenay in 1979 with his wife Gwen. This was to become their "Haida Gold Gardens" which is known throughout Vancouver Island as a showpiece of rhododendrons and companion plants. Haida Gold Gardens is host to many garden tours and charity events throughout the year, including 'tours and tea' for the elderly and an annual 'open garden' at Christmas where proceeds go to a local food bank.

As an avid gardener, Harry was a founding member of the Comox Valley Horticultural Society in 1978. His increasing interest in Rhododendrons resulted in the formation of the North Island Rhododendron Society in October of 1984. Harry has been active in NIRS since its inception, taking a role on the Executive for 18 of the 23 years and elected as President for 13 of those years. He actively supported and encouraged the members from the Qualicum area to form their own Chapter as the Mount Arrowsmith Rhododendron Society in 1989 and continues to act as liaison between the clubs. He has been a cornerstone of NIRS and for his contributions was awarded the Bronze Medal in 1995.

As Director for District 1 from 2004 to 2006 Harry worked to promote the goals of the ARS and support the Chapters within the District. He encouraged Chapters to work more closely together through continuing to share speakers, facilitating cross-Chapter visits and garden tours, and sharing ideas. Believing that the social aspect of club membership was one of its drawing cards, Harry frequently arranged local tours for visiting speakers, and typically hosted them at his home.

Harry is an advocate for the growing of rhododendrons and has actively promoted its popularity with the public. For many years he had envisioned a public park featuring rhododendrons, showcasing the wide variety of flower and leaf forms available. To that end, he initiated and was instrumental in the development of the Comox Valley Rhododendron Garden which was a joint project between the City of Courtenay and the North Island Rhododendron Society. The Garden was first approved in 1993 and opened in 1997. To highlight hybridizers from Vancouver Island he initiated and collected plants for a new section of the garden which is known as the 'Born on Vancouver Island' bed which opened in May 2007. This public garden is adjacent to a park walkway and is visited by hundreds of people each day.

In 2003 Rhododendron 'Courtenay Lady' developed by Harry was chosen as The City of Courtenay's Official Plant. In his efforts to focus public attention on Rhododendrons, Harry was instrumental in having May proclaimed as 'Rhododendron Month in the City of Courtenay' in 2007 and 2008.

Harry is always available to share his enthusiasm and knowledge about growing Rhododendrons. Harry has written articles for our Chapter and District newsletters, written brief articles for the ARS Journal, is often interviewed by the local newspapers, and is a frequent guest speaker to clubs and organizations across the District. Harry is very personable, and is able to share his knowledge in a way that is satisfying to both the novice and the experienced grower.

Plants with structure and scent have always appealed to Harry, and in the late 1980's he began to do some hybridizing. He has developed a number of Rhodos including the Courtenay Five crosses (Courtenay King, Courtenay Queen, Courtenay Princess, Courtenay Lady, and Courtenay Duke) registered in 2001 and propagated at Brigg's Nursery in Olympia Washington. These can be seen at the gardens of Government House in Victoria BC, the Born on Vancouver Island bed in the Comox Valley Rhododendron Garden in the City of Courtenay, and in many private gardens across the province.

In addition to hybridizing the Royal 'Courtenay' series,



Harry has also developed 'Iona Cee', a sister seedling to 'Courtenay Queen' & 'Courtenay Princess', very similar to rhododendron Haida Gold with a later blooming period. Named for BC's Lieutenant Governor Iona Campagnolo, it was registered in 2006 by Bill Dale.

Harry is enthusiastic about the plant possibilities through hybridization and has held workshops for those interested in developing new Rhodos in this way. Always willing to share his techniques, he has also held workshops on propagation by cuttings and through grafting. Harry has been involved in discussions and plans for a propagation greenhouse to be established at Milner Gardens and Woodland in Qualicum Beach BC at some time in the future and has been interested in seeing a rhododendron species garden located there.

Harry believes strongly that enthusiasm for growing Rhodos will come from growing plants that do well in each region. In addition, it may be important at some point in time to know where certain Rhodo varieties are located in District 1. In 1993 Harry started recording the varieties of Rhododendrons and known crosses that grow successfully in this district and at last count he had nominations from over 113 gardeners and an inventory of over 4000 plants. The list is available in the form of a self published booklet "Rhododendron Varieties in BC" and it includes the name of the rhododendron, whose garden the plant is in, and where the garden is situated

Community and fellowship are important to Harry and he is always noticeable in a group. He encourages members to participate in related activities outside of the club meetings, and to attend Conferences whenever possible. At Chapter, cross-Chapter, District, or public events, Harry and wife Gwen can be seen circulating and chatting, introducing newer members to others, connecting those with similar interests, smiling and laughing, and generally making participants feel welcome.

Harry has spent many, many years as an ambassador for the genus rhododendron across our District, and has been an avid supporter of membership in the American Rhododendron Society. We therefore nominate Harry R. Wright for the ARS Silver Medal.

At the Annual ARS Convention held in Everett Washington (29th April - 3rd May, 2009), the American Rhododendron Society President, Fred Whitney, presented the Silver Medal Award to Harry R. Wright.

THE CITATION READS:

For over two decades, you have been an ambassador for the genus rhododendron and an avid promoter of membership and participation in the American Rhododendron Society. As founding member of the North Island Rhododendron Society, you have worked tirelessly as President and Director throughout the Chapter's

history. You have been instrumental in the development of both your own "Haida Gold Gardens" with your wife Gwen, and the public "Comox Valley Rhododendron Garden", providing enjoyment to countless citizens and visitors. As a speaker, teacher, writer, propagator and hybridizer, you have ensured that rhododendrons maintain a high profile. As Director of District 1, your support of individual Chapters and encouragement of interactive sharing has emphasized both education and fellowship. You are an inspiration to all members of the American Rhododendron Society.

For outstanding service the ARS is proud to award the Silver Medal to Harry R. Wright.'

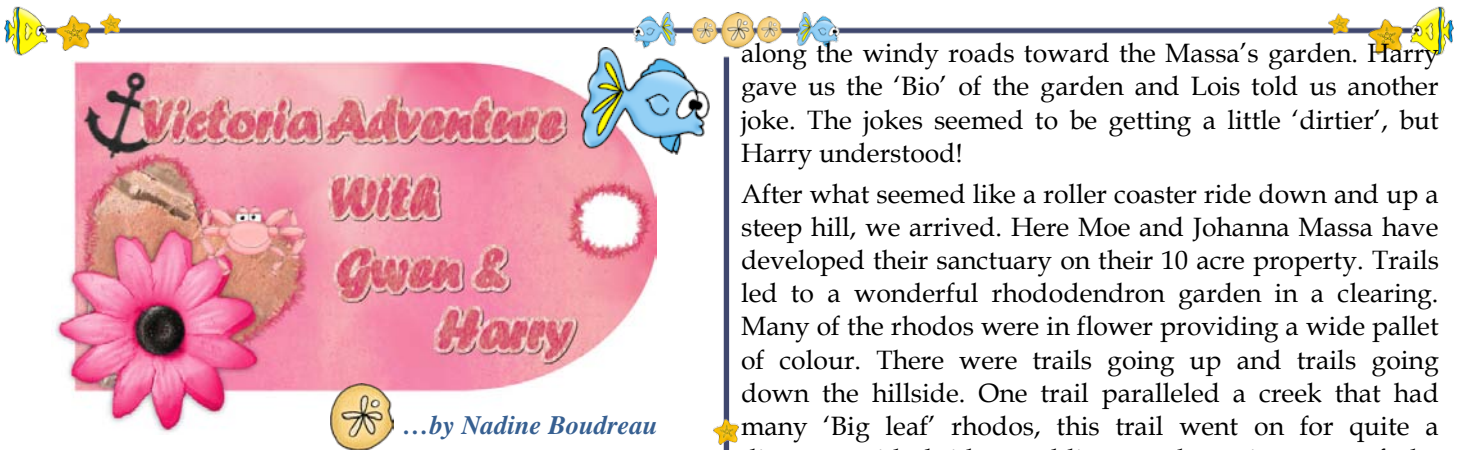

Excitement was in the air early Wednesday morning on Chaster Road, as all the rhodo addicts knew Harry and Gwen had a great day planned for us. And as usual we were not to be disappointed!!

As we departed, Harry informed us that we would be picking up 3 more passengers en route. As we looked around the bus for empty seats, we wondered if Harry had sold a ticket for the 'private' room in the back of the bus! But he had calculated correctly and we had room for the three and the bus was full. We were all comfortable and settled in for our cruise down to Victoria. Harry kept us entertained with some short stories, and also gave us the whistle rule: 2 short whistle blasts meant we had 10 minutes left at the garden, 1 short whistle meant we had 5 minutes, after that you were on your own to get back home!!

When we turned off the Highway at Shawnigan Lake, the anticipation of our first garden visit of the day grew. There was a light rain falling, but it did not dampen the mood. Driving along the lake and native woodland provided a beautiful route. It was through this windy section that Harry asked Lois to come to the front of the bus to tell one of her jokes; we all had a good laugh and Harry understood the joke!!

The garden of Alan and Sandy Campbell was beautiful. From the road, you looked up tiered rockery to the home. Natural rock outcropping was the bases for the tiers, most of us walked up the driveway to the home; it was here that you walked through a long arbor with a stream running beside it to enter the garden. Within this tiered garden there was a large collection of Rhodos, woodland flowers, mosses, ferns and maples. Al and Sandy had worked very hard to restore and compliment this area as it had been overgrown with ivy. The back yard of the home would not disappoint, there were beds filled with lilacs, peonies, perennials and interesting trees such as a Catalpa. They had lovely sitting areas, a fire pit and a pond. Sandy had graciously proved coffee, tea and goodies. Very nice! We were all back to the bus on time and Harry didn't even have to blow his whistle!

Back on the bus and down the Malahat, we turned off toward Sooke. Bill, the bus driver did a great job driving

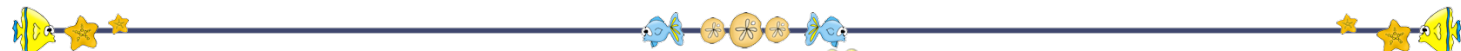
along the windy roads toward the Massa's garden. Harry gave us the 'Bio' of the garden and Lois told us another joke. The jokes seemed to be getting a little 'dirtier', but Harry understood!

After what seemed like a roller coaster ride down and up a steep hill, we arrived. Here Moe and Johanna Massa have developed their sanctuary on their 10 acre property. Trails led to a wonderful rhododendron garden in a clearing. Many of the rhodos were in flower providing a wide pallet of colour. There were trails going up and trails going down the hillside. One trail paralleled a creek that had many 'Big leaf' rhodos, this trail went on for quite a distance with bridges adding to the enjoyment of the garden. Moe and Johanna had personalized their garden with figurines and even a small chapel. The Massa's extended their generosity by not only opening their garden to us, but also giving each of us a small rhodo that they had propagated. Giving them our thanks and good byes at the bus door, and petting the family dog, we heard our first whistle warning from Harry. We think he just had to blow that thing! Our bus driver, Bill Cove, had turned the bus around, thank goodness, before we had boarded, as I think Bernice would have fainted from fear if we had to back down the big hill.

Off we went; the bus was abuzz with chatter. We had seen two great gardens and we were on to others. Another garden 'bio', and a joke from Lois, (I think Harry got it.) More windy roads and then we were there. The Blackmore's garden was awesome. A pathway led us through Rhodos, water features and Arbutus trees. The path brought us to a large deck that ran the whole length of the home. Though it was cloudy, you could see the Sooke hills beyond. There were various sitting areas, the farthest one having a pond at its side. The garden had been damaged in the 2007 winter storm; Roy and Lois were still busy redoing many areas. They were also very gracious, serving tea and coffee in the gazebo. The whistle blasts echoed through the trees, and we were off once more.

Garden bio, funny joke from Lois (Harry understood it), and we were at Ann and Tom Widdowson's home, our next garden in West Saanich. A heritage garden and home, has bluebells flowering everywhere. Perennials filled the borders in the front of the house, with a large veggie garden on one side, and as you walked to the back of the property, past a huge variegated Liriodendron, you could hear water rushing down the Colquitz Creek. Here there was a pathway with a cement bridge crossing the creek; this area was carpeted with bluebells - truly enchanting. The path ended at another lovely garden area with Rhodos. Much of the garden was fenced, so I asked if it was for keeping deer out. Tom explained that it was not for deer, it was for keeping their cats from going out near the busy road. Lucky cats!

On to the bus, no whistle this time, and off we went to the final garden. Another garden bio, another funny (and a



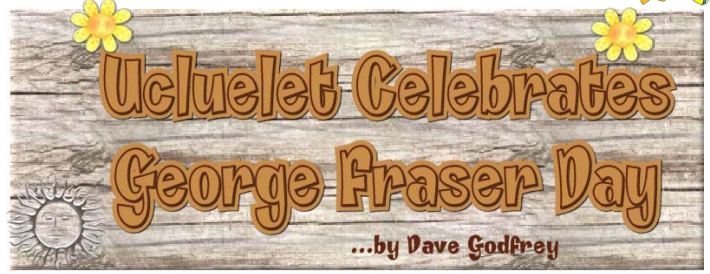
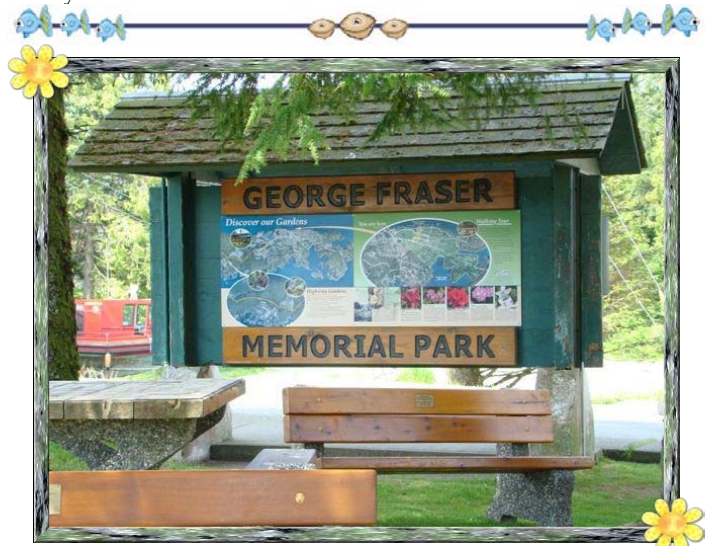
little dirtier) joke from Lois had us all laughing. It was rumored down the aisle of the bus that Harry “didn’t get the joke”.

But as we got closer, we could see the crowd was for another passion... wine and appetizers had been set out for us; the Webbs had really extended their hospitality. They answered many questions and showed us their propagation greenhouse. There were quite a few rhodos available. They also had a unique water feature, a natural creek flowing through the back, and they had laid logs that had been carved for the water to flow over. Ah, time to get back on the bus, can’t even remember if the whistle was blown!!

On the way home, we drew our raffle prizes. First draw was for a beautiful ‘Courtenay Queen’, with the winner being, Bob Smith. Our second draw was for 2 tickets to the horticultural garden tour, generously donated by Isabel. Those tickets were won by Ruth Rose. Lois told us her final joke of the day, the bus roared with laughter, and Harry asked us if we got it!

As we drove along, the talking seemed to quiet down, tired maybe; or if the others were like me, just reflecting on the day, the lovely gardens, each so different yet warm and inviting. But really on how much fun the trips are, all because of the company. Thanks for a wonderful tour Harry and Gwen!
